MR. FRED LUSI

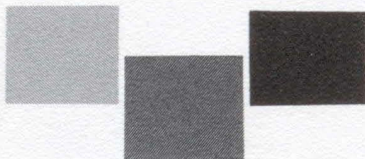

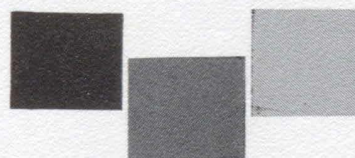

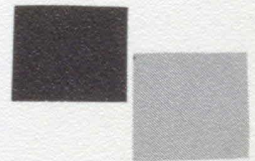
MR. JOHN HORNER

MR. EDWARD BLOCKOWICZ

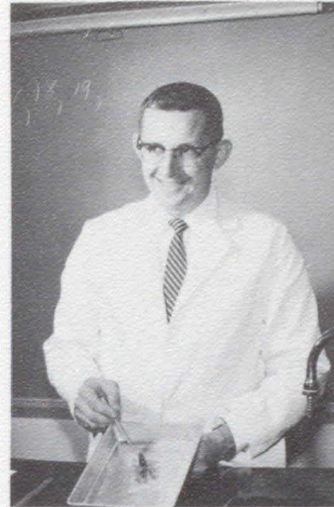

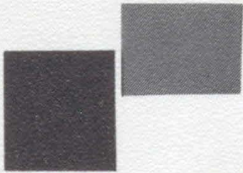
MRS. WILMAH ANDERSON

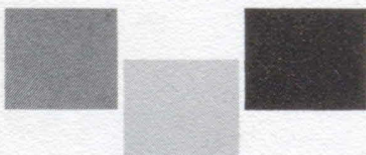

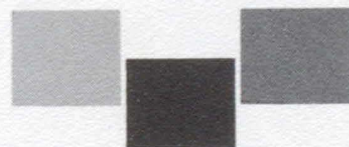

"Where you hear a song echo, there you can go without fear."



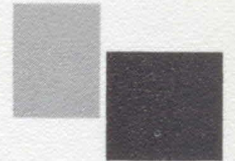
MR. JOHN WEBER

"No one knows what he can do till he tries."

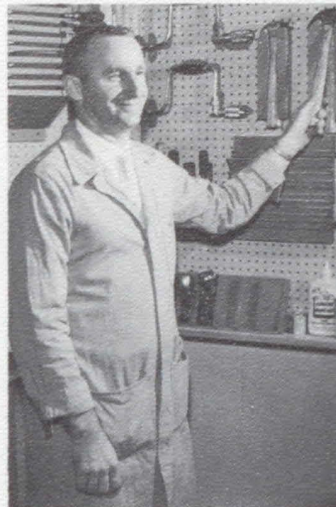


MR. EDWARD HRUTKAY

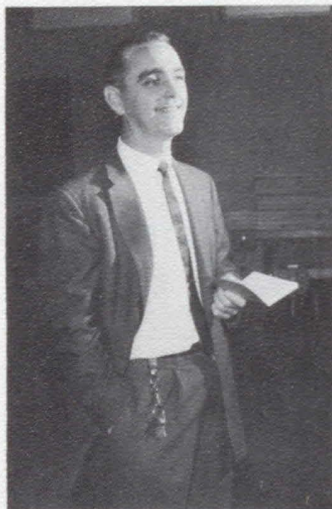

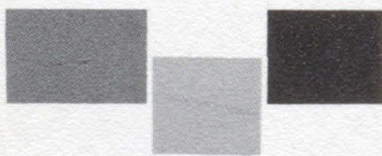


MRS. CLAIRE VAN DYNE

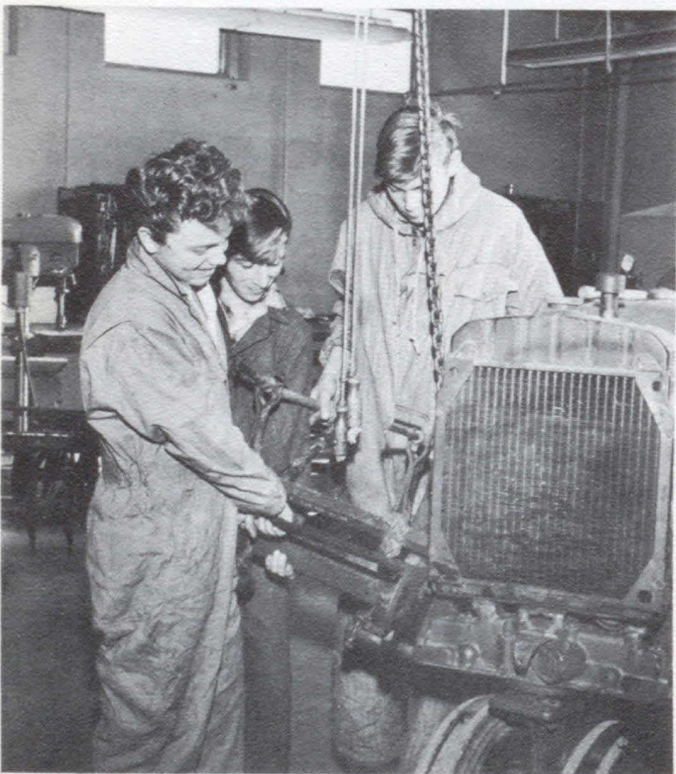

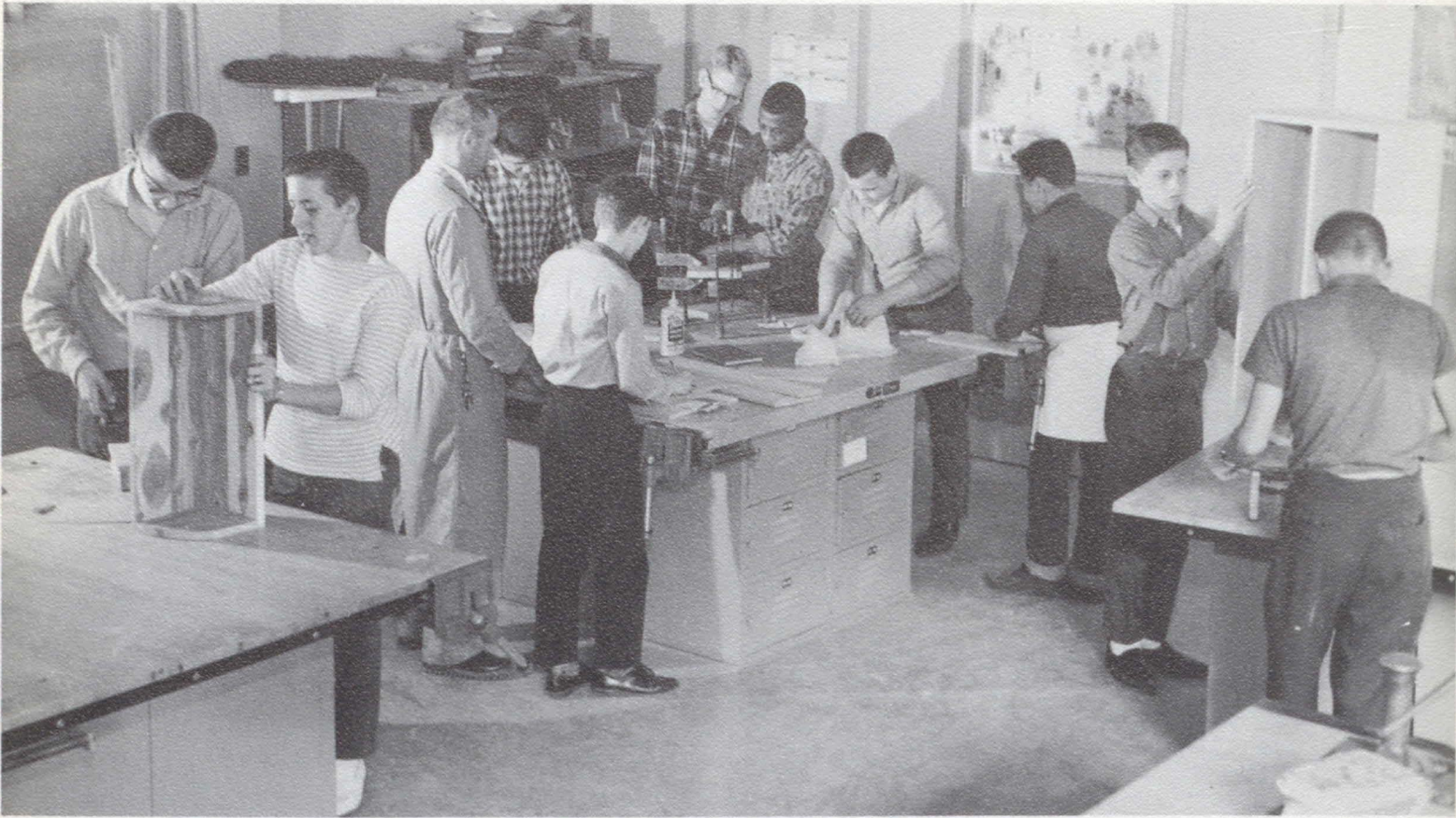

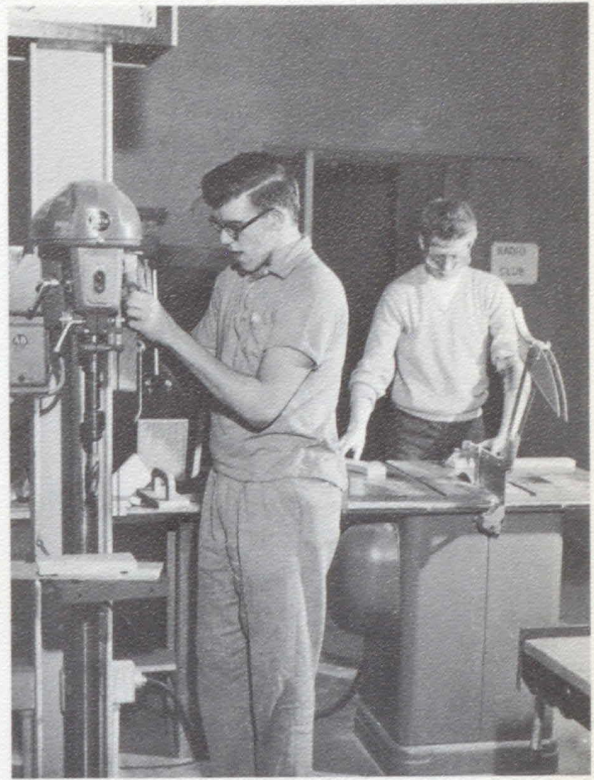

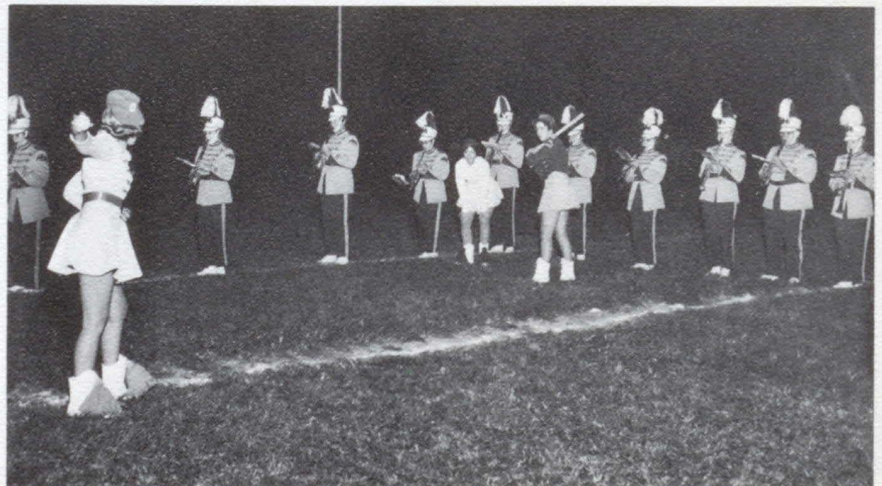

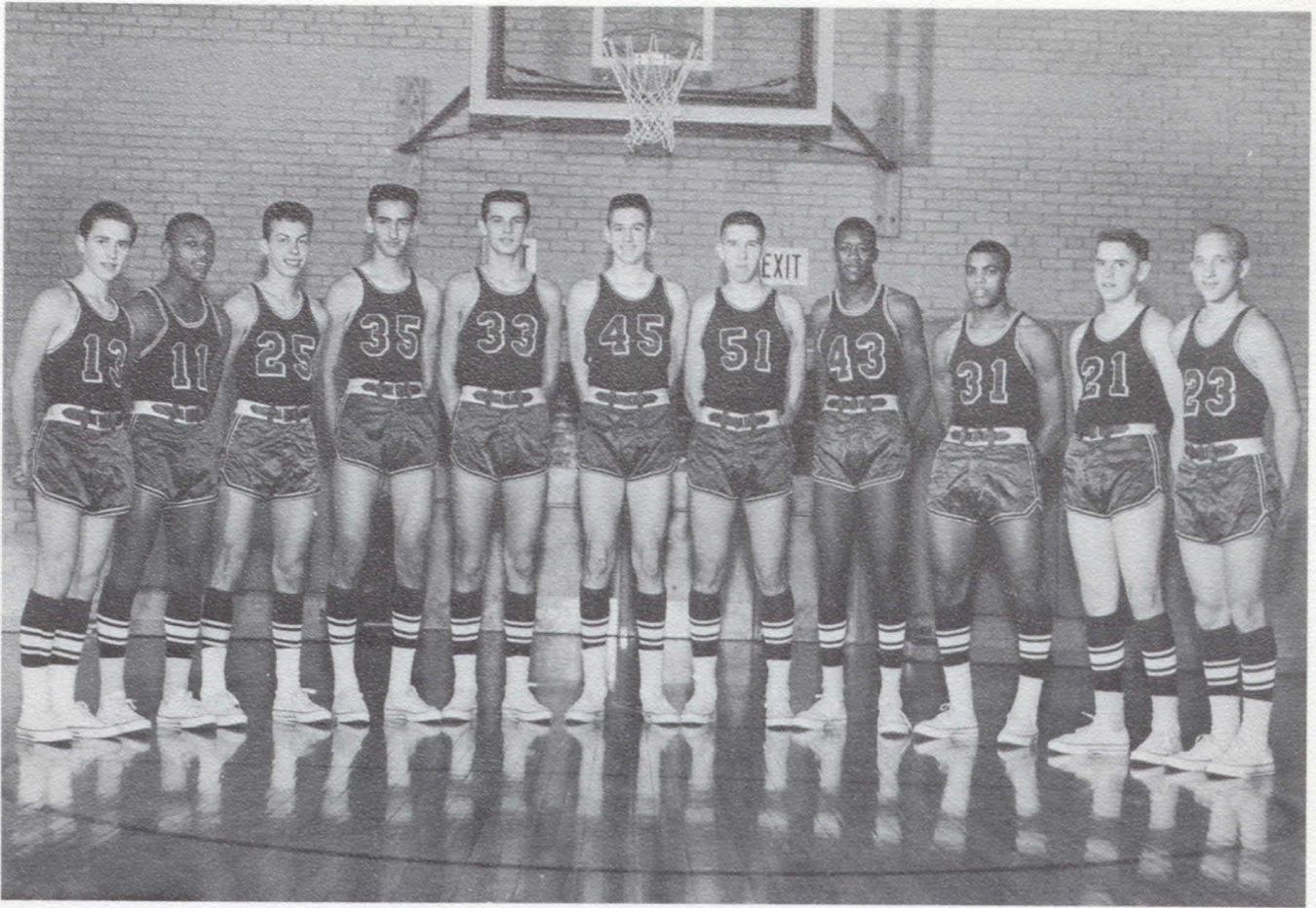

As a result of his participation in sports, Paul is interested in the activities of the Varsity Club.



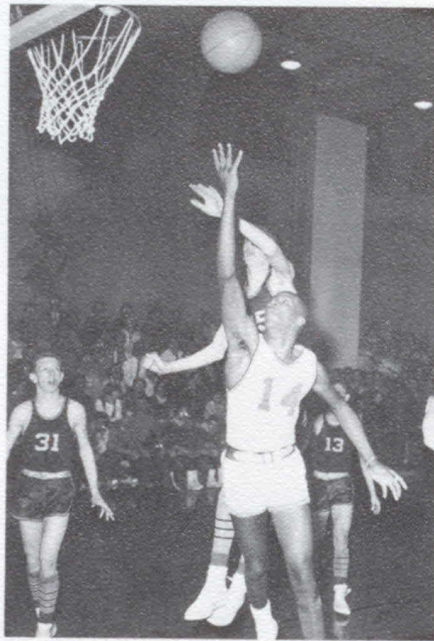
