
With enthusiasm and pride the class of "66" presented their Junior Prom. The Prom was held in the Fort Cherry High School Gymnasium on a beautiful May evening.

The Student Council is an organization of students, elected by students, to serve as official representatives of the student body in all matters concerning the students themselves.

Council members are elected from each homeroom in the tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades. Ed Richards, president of the student body, is also president of Student Council. Miss Kirk and Mr. Loughman, the Guidance Counselors at Fort Cherry, act as sponsors.

The members of Student Council have many projects. Among these projects are paying for the National Honor Society pins, sending the incoming president to the Student Council Workshop and decorating the Christmas tree.

To finance their projects members sell wrapping paper, sweat shirts, and sponsor the boxing glove basketball game.

National Honor Society



Encouraging students to excel in scholarship, in character, in leadership, and in service to the school is the purpose of the National Honor Society. Students earn the coveted membership by maintaining a B average or better and by being given superior ratings in the areas of scholarship, service, leadership, and character. Any member who drops below these standards automatically forfeits his membership in the Honor Society and may not be readmitted.

A student first qualifies scholastically for membership; next his name is placed on a list of eligible students. This list is then presented to the faculty for consideration in the areas of leadership, both in curricular and extracurricular activities, in personal services for teachers, and in strength of character. A student who is rated low in these requirements is not admitted to membership in the National Honor Society.

Probationary members chosen from tenth grade students must maintain the high standards required to become active members in their junior and senior years. A sophomore who fails to meet the required standards may become a member in his junior year if, by that time, he has met them.







Under the leadership of Mrs. Dyson and Mrs. Holleran, the girls who make up this organization are able to carry out their services to their fullest capacity.





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
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Although our lives are filled with the rush and excitement of graduation and with plans for the future, memories of six wonderful years add a touch of sadness and serenity to our lives.
