
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

General Information.

LOCATION.

HICKORY ACADEMY is located at Hickory, Mt. Pleasant Township, Washington County, Penn'a., surrounded by a beautiful and fertile region. The town is noted for the high moral tone of its citizens, its excellent society, and healthfulness. A large and well furnished building has been erected in order to accommodate the rapid increase of students.

HISTORY AND AIM.

On September 5, 1891, the first steps were taken by the people of Hickory and vicinity to establish in their midst an institution of learning. On September 21 of the same year, the first term of Hickory Academy was opened in the building now occupied by the post-office, Prof. B. B. Wolf, Principal.

The aim of the institution, as then manifested, is to give young men and women a practical education and preparation for college or seminary. Since its organization, over two hundred students have been in attendance; fifty have graduated. Of these students, two have entered the ministry, one the profession of law, six the profession of medicine and dentistry, eighteen have graduated from college and seminary or are in attendance; over fifty are teachers, and many others successful farmers, mechanics, clerks, etc.

The curriculum of the classical course is in accordance with that of our leading colleges preparatory to the Freshman year.

Thorough work is the motto, and many of the graduates have taken honors in higher institutions.

Normal Course.

A Normal Course is introduced the third term for the benefit of those wishing to prepare for the teachers' examination. In this course attention is given to music and drawing.

DIPLOMAS.

A course of study covering three years of work has been prepared, an outline of which has been given. Students completing the course will be granted diplomas. The Academy is a chartered institution. Students holding diplomas from this institution can be admitted to our first-class colleges without examination.

LITERARY SOCIETY.

An excellent opportunity for literary improvement and parliamentary drill is afforded by the literary society of the Academy composed of the students and under direction of the Principal. This work is considered on all hands of great importance.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

A library of choice books is open to the students; also magazines and papers. During the past year additional room for books has been made and the library increased.

LECTURES.

A lecture course is conducted during the year for the benefit of the Academy.

MUSIC.

Students desiring to study instrumental music have the opportunity at very reasonable rates. Some time is also given during the year to chorus work.

TUITION.

For the first term, 13 weeks, \$12.00.
For the second term, 13 weeks, \$12.00.
For the third term, 10 weeks, \$9.00.

BOARDING AND ROOMS.

Boarding and rooms can be obtained at very reasonable rates; and, by boarding in clubs, expenses can be made very low.

RELIGIOUS PRIVILEGES.

A short period is given to devotional exercises each morning, conducted by the Principal, at which service all students are required to be present.
