In a few cases, where no marker exists and it is known that certain burials were made here, the names and dates have been included. The list, too, includes most recent burials here, such as Jennie Brown Damm who died in January, 1984.

As can be seen in this book, most of the records contain only names of the deceased and dates of birth and death, in years, where both are available, also in some cases, ages at date of death. Since we have in our files, for most cases the complete inscription on the headstone, if anyone desires this it can be furnished upon application to: A. D. White, Hickory, PA 15340.

For the purposes of locating graves in this Cemetery, we have numbered the row in which each grave is located. Row no. 1 is at the north end of the Cemetery and succeeding numbered rows are counted in order from that row. Row no. 35 is near the fence at the south end of the Cemetery, to the rear of the church building and beside the public school property. Graves without a row number are either not marked, or have not been identified as to location.

Birth dates are established from grave markers, obituaries and numerous other sources, but in some cases dates are established from age at date of death.

1918 DIES AT CRAFTON**

Hickory, Sept. 27.—Mrs. Ida McCalmont McBurney, wife of William H. McBurney, formerly of this place, but for the past 20 years a resident of Crafton, passed away at her home this afternoon, aged 51 years. Mrs. McBurney was in her usual health until about 10 months ago when she sustained a stroke of paralysis and since that time had been in a serious condition for the greater part of the time. Mrs. McBurney was united in mar-

riage September 8, 1888, to Mr. McBurney and to this union two children were born who besides the husband survive: Mrs. J. H. Crawford and Miss Florence McBurney, both of Crafton. Rev. Blackwood Was Blue Law Champion

1865-1951

Rev. Robert M. Blackwood, fiery champion of the "strict Sabbath," died here today after a lingering illness. He was 85.

The Rev. Mr. Blackwood retired last year as secretary of the Western Pennsylvania Sabbath Assn. after 26 years in that post.

A staunch defender of the State's 157-year-old "Blue Laws," Mr. Blackwood was perhaps best known to Pittsburghers for his annual opposition to the holding of the County Free Fair on a Sunday.

Yearly Protest

Year in and year out, he appeared before the County Commissioners to protest this and to urge suspension of all Fair activities for that one day.

In 1942, the Rev. Mr. Blackwood was in the public limelight when he denounced collection of scrap on Sundays as a desecration of the Sabbath.

But Henry J. Yute, then director of City supplies, retorted that war, which had engulfed the U. S. on a Sunday at Pearl Harbor a few months earlier, was on "a seven-day-a-week schedule."

Hit Bond Rally

Dr. Blackwood also protested at one time against the staging of a War Bond rally on a Sunday at Forbes Field.

The minister was a graduate of Geneva College, Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary and Indiana University.

He served as pastor of United Presbyterian churches in Coraopolis, Farrell, Pa., Dayton, O., and Bloomington, Ind., for 25 years before becoming associated with the Sabbath Assn.

He also was a moderator and clerk of the Ecclesiastical Courts

Hickory, Feb. 4.—Word was received here this evening of the death of David A. Brown, principal of the Soho schools, Fifth avenue, Pittsburg, and a former resident of this place. Mr. Brown's death occurred at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon at his home, 720 Glenn avenue, Wilkinsburg, after an illness of more than two months. David A. Brown was born January 19, 1875, at what is now Acheson station on the Wabash railroad. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Brown, of Acheson, who both survive. The Brown family is one of the oldest and most prominent in this section and has many connections throughout the entire county. After receiving a common school education David A. Brown taught for a number of years. For three years he was in the Morris school in Mt. Pleasant township and then went to Hickory academy. He later attended the Slippery Rock Normal school, graduating in 1898. After his graduation he became principal of the Burgettstown high school, going from there to Springdale in Allegheny county and thence to Pittsburg, where he had been for the past two years. Mr. Brown was a particularly earnest young man giving of his best to his chosen profession and had many friends here and in his new home at Pittsburg. During Thanksgiving week Mr. Brown was taken ill of grip which later developed into pneumonia. Two weeks ago his condition was very serious but he rallied and it was thought he was on the road to recovery. He suffered a relapse early this morning and his death followed this afternoon. MATTHEW B. BROWN IS SUMMONED BY DEATH

Widely Known and Highly Respected Farmer of the Hickory Section Passes Away at the Age of 74 Years.

Hickory, June 23.—Matthew Borland Brown, one of the most widely known farmers of this section, passed away at his home near here at 7 o'clock this morning. Although he had been in failing health for the last several months, he had been able to welcome visitors until the last four days.

Mr. Brown was a son of the late David and Rebecca Borland Brown, and was born in May, 1851, on a farm near Noblestown, Allegheny county. About 70 years ago, the mother having died, the father moved with his children to the farm upon which M. B. Brown thereafter resided. In 1874 Mr. Brown was united in marriage with Miss Belle Russell, and on June 25, 1924, this happy couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

A man of marked intelligence, firm convictions, and unusual energy Mr. Brown lived a strenuous life until very recent years, when failing eyesight limited his activity. A brother of the late David W. Brown of the Washington and Allegheny county bars, he was keenly interested in the processes of the courts, and none followed legal matters more closely than he. In his long term as justice of the peace he showed marked legal acumen.

WELL KNOWN HICKORY MAN CALLED BY DEATH

Hickory, Nov. 28.—John C. Brown, aged 65 years, died at 9:30 o'clock tonight at the home of his brother-in-law, Dr. Joseph McElroy this place. His death was caused by pneumonia following an attack of influenza, after an illness of one week.

Mr. Brown was one of the best known and most highly respected residents of this section. He was a son of David and Rebecca Borland Brown and was born near Oakdale, but practically all of his life had been spent in Mt. Pleasant township. He was never married. Mr. Brown was a member of the Hickory United Presbyterian church and in politics was an active Democrat.

He is survived by one brother, M. B. Brown, who resides on the old homestead and one sister, Mrs. Joseph McElroy of this place. Funeral arrangements have not been made, but the funeral will be private. Interment will be in the Hickory cemetery.

Besides his wife there survive four sons and three daughters: John E., of McDonald; William R., manager of the home farm; Dr. Walter E., of Pittsburg; Robert Russell, of New York City; Miss Dorothy, of Pittsburg; Miss Jane, and Miss Margaret. Mrs. Margaret McElroy, of Hickory, is a sister.

Funeral services will be held at his late home on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Charles Stunkard, pastor of Hickory United Presbyterian church of which Mr. Brown had been a lifelong member.

A man of unique personality, "Math," as his host of friends called him, possessed to a high degree the wit of the Irish, and likewise the tender-heartedness ascribed to that race. He was not in all ways a typical farmer, nor in all ways a typical church member, although capable and faithful in these directions. He was everlastingly "Math" Brown—a man who "feared God and took his own part"—and spent all his spare time telling jokes and making everyone around him happier.

Losing his parents early in his life, Mr. Brown, as a mere child became used to looking out for himself. He was aggressive. It may even be said that he loved a fight, in court or out of it. Where others clouded issues or suppressed views, he came out flatly with his opinion,

letting the chips fall where they would.

There was no decay of family life in the home of which "Math" Brown was the father. Although his keen tongue lopped off what he considered to be the non-essentials of dogma, he had a fundamental faith, to which he was true. His impatience with "goody-goodness" is well understood from his own words on the matter, "The Lord was not so narrow as some people try to make him out."

During the last several years, with eyesight dimming, Mr. Brown turned from a most active career as a farmer to the limited existence of one whose light had failed. In this trial he was remarkably patient, and in his last illness he remained cheerful. In the closing weeks of life his face was as calm as a snow-topped mountain peak in the glow of the western sun.

Miss Margaret Brown of R. D. 3, McDonald, died at 11:50 a.m. Tuesday, December 22, 1959, in the Homestead hospital, following a brief illness.

A daughter of the late Matthew B. and Isabel Russell Brown, she was born November 6, 1894, at the Brown homestead in R. D. 3, McDonald, and was the youngest of nine children.

Miss Brown was a graduate of Hickory Academy and Westminster College and attended Columbia University. She taught school in Mt. Pleasant Township for several years and was a former member of the Mt. Pleasant U. P. church.

She leaves two sisters, Jennie, the wife of Walter Damm of Homestead, and Dorothy Brown of Orlando, Fla. There are 12 nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held December 24 in the Mt. Pleasant U. P. church, Hickory, in charge of Dr. G. P. Garmen of Calendar Memorial church, Wilksburg, assisted by the Rev. William A. Hadden, pastor of the Mt. Pleasant U. P. church. Burial was in Mt. Pleasant cemetery.

D. W. BROWN, ESQ., DEAD.

A Well-Known Canonsburg Citizen Dies at Mercy Hospital, Pittsburg.

D. W. Brown, Esq., of this place, died at Mercy hospital, Pittsburg, at 11.45 p. m. on Saturday last, January 9, of typhoid pneumonia, in the 46th year of his age. Mr. Brown had been taken sick some 15 days previous to his death, and A. A. Coleman, by request, accompanied him to the hospital, where he continued to grow worse, and died at the time above given. He was booked for an address at the farmers' institute in this place, but was prevented by his sickness from filling the engagement. Mr. Brown was a member of the Brown family of Mt. Pleasant township. He graduated at Wooster, O., university and afterwards studied law, and when through with his studies was admitted to the Washington bar. He was an able lawyer, and stood high among and was popular with his fellow-attorneys. In politics he was an ardent Democrat. He took a great interest in politics and in 1880 he was the Democratic candidate for district attorney against R. C. McConnell. Brown was defeated by a majority of only 136. Mr. Brown had lived in our town for a number of years and here he had a host of friends who were shocked and sorry when the news of his death came. Miss Buchanan, daughter of Thos. Buchanan, was reared in the congregation of Hickory, Pa., where she united with the church, and held her membership until 1869, when she, with the rest of the family moved to North Buffalo congregation. For a number of years past she has been in feeble health, and once or twice brought to the borders of death, with sickness, but God raised her up and continued her life with moderate health until the 21th of June, when she took her bed for the last time. When the physician informed the friends that there was little or no hope of recovery, sorrow filled their hearts, especially the mother, who was looking to her daughter for company and comfort in her old days; but the near approach of death was not unexpected to the deceased, and when told that all hope of her recovery was taken away, she cheerfully submitted to God's will. At times her suffering was severe, yet she uttered not a single murmur, but patiently endured her affliction, knowing the hand of God was in it. She let patience have its perfect work, that she might be perfect and entire, wanting nothing. When asked about her sickness, she was wont to say, "It's steadily approaching the end." And so it was. Her decline was very gradual, and not till the end of the third week did death terminate her suffering. ACTIVE IN COMMUNITY

William, Frank Caldwell, in his 72nd years, a life-long resident of Hickory, died in the Mercy Hospital, Pittsburgh, Saturday, August 1 after an illness of five months.

Mr. Caldwell was the eldest son of the late James and Nancy Caldwell. He had spent his entire life on the farm on which he was born and had always been very devoted to the interests of his home and community. Quite early in life, he became a member of the United Presbyterian Church at Hickory and was senior elder of the congregation at the time of his death. All his life he had been interested in the activities of the church and was a very regular member.

For many years he was a member of the school board of Mt. Pleasant Township, serving at the time of the building of the Vocational School.

Mr. Caldwell did not limit his interests to his own community and at different times went to other parts of the United States, his last trip being to Phoenix, Ariz. where he spent a part of a winter with Cal Hunter, familiar to Observer readers.

In 1895 he was united in marriage with Venna M. Griffiths, also of Mt. Pleasant Township, who died in 1927. Two children by this union survive, James William, who is located in Wheeling, W. Va., and Mary I., a teacher in Perry Senior High School, Pittsburgh.

James Caldwell, aged 21 years, of Woodrow, was instantly killed about 12:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon when a freight train crashed into his automobile at the Woodrow crossing of the Pittsburgh & West Virginia Railroad.

Young Caldwell, a well known resident of the district, had been to Hickory and was returning to his home when the tragic accident occurred. The train crashed into the side of the machine opposite the young man, who was so badly injured he was dead when the train crew reached him.

The Woodrow crossing is regarded as dangerous and a movement was started to change it to an overhead pass but financial condition of the county and railroad prevented it being carried out.

The young man was a son of Robert and Jennie Caldwell, who survive with one brother, Robert, Jr., at home, and a sister, Mrs. Leroy Lee, of Cross Creek. He attended Mt. Pleasant High School.

DEATH OF W. P. CHERRY.

Sketch of an Eccentric, But a Useful Citizen.

William P. Cherry, who died at the old Cherry homestead in Mount Pleasant township, on Saturday evening, April 12th, 1890, was the oldest child of Edward Cherry and Rebecca Perrin, and the grandson of John Cherry, the pioneer, who in 1774 settled on the most eastern branch of Raccoon Creek, to which has been given the name of Cherry's Run. William was born Dec. 6, 1803, in the main building of what was once the Cherry Fort, and for many years past has been the only person living who had any recollection of the pioneers, all of whom he had seen and known except his own grandfather, whose death occurred in 1780, caused by the accidental discharge of his own gun while taking a drink of water at a spring in one of his fields 23 years before his grandson was born. During his early years the hardships, dangers and trials of the pioneer were common themes of conversation and often talked over in his presence and hearing; and hence he grew to manhood with a full knowledge of all that pertained to the settlement and development of the neighborhood which he always took great pleasure in reading or talking over with any one with whom he was on familiar terms; for he was of a singularly diffident disposition, and avoided society, especially that of women, in whose presence he always manifested much embarrassment. He was what we call a self-made man, never went to school but a few days, yet was a hard student for many years; after laboring hard all day, would take his candle, books, slate and study closely for hours, and was well up in all that pertained to an ordinary English education. His great force, however, was in mathematics and he could work out almost any of the knotty and difficult questions which at that day were in continual circulation. He also studied surveying, purchasing a set of instruments with which he often made surveys in the neighborhood and plotted neatly and correctly. He was, however, somewhat deficient in imparting what he knew and, when pressed too closely for the reason why he solved a proposition so and so, would sometimes become confused and embarrassed. He was ever an industrious, hard-working man, faithful and laborious, and yet seemed to lack that tact for dealing and business management, so necessary to the successful farmer; was always frugal and plain, both in dress and living. In one respect he differed from a great majority

of his neighbors and friends; he took no stock in churches, nor cared for preaching, not so much because of any particular belief that prejudiced his mind against them, or because of his unbelief, but more because of his retiring disposition and natural dislike to mix in public assemblies, for he carefully read the scriptures, lived more at peace with his neighbors than anybody in the community; was strictly moral in all his conduct, kind and gentle as a child, and while he may not have made so many friends as some others, he has certainly left as few enemies as any person that ever died in the community.

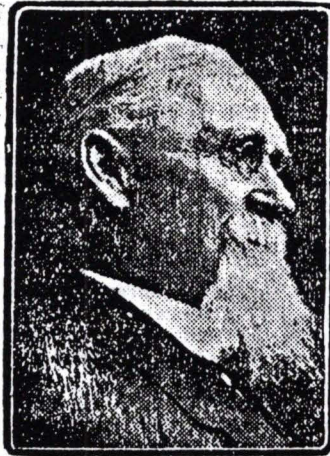

TAUGHT IN S. S. 50 YEARS

Hickory, Sept. 18.—John M. Griffith, aged 82, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of this place, passed away at his home here at 6:15 o'clock this morning after an illness of several weeks. Hickory, July 23.—John Haynes Miller, a prominent farmer, church worker and well-known citizen of Mount Pleasant township, died suddenly this morning early at his home near Hickory. Apoplexy was the cause of his death. He was stricken while yet in bed.

Mr. Miller had not been ill and had retired last evening in his usual health. He became ill shortly after 5 o'clock, called to his son, S. Edwin Miller, who lives with him, but death came before anything could be done for his relief.

Mr. Miller was born April 13, 1838, in Hickory, but lived from the time he was four years old, until about 40 years ago near McDonald. Some years later he located in Mt. Pleasant township, about equi-distant from Hickory and Midway, where he became identified with the United Presbyterian congregation of Center. In May, 1892, he transferred his membership to Mt. Pleasant congregation, in connection with which, for a period of 16 years, he lived a quiet, useful and consistent Christian life.

While not to himself, perhaps, yet to his family and friends, his death came as a surprise. Retiring in his usual health about 11 o'clock, an hour and a half later life was extinct. "Watch, for ye know not when the time is." A widow, three sons and two daughters survive to mourn his departure. "May the consolations of God not be small with them."

James McBurney Dies Suddenly at His Home in Hickory — Was in His 77th Year — Successful in Business 1835-2-13-1912

Hickory, Feb. 13.—James McBurney, one of the best known residents of the northern part of Washington county, died this evening at 7 o'clock at his home in Hickory following an illness of but a few days. Less than a week ago Mr. McBurney complained of a slight indisposition but his condition was not considered serious and he did not take his bed until yesterday. This evening he suffered an attack of heart trouble and died suddenly.

The son of John and Jennie McBurney, James McBurney was born at Cherry Valley on March 10, 1835. He had spent his entire life in Washington county. For many years he had been engaged in the livery business in Hickory retiring from active work about three years ago. About a quarter of a century ago he was engaged in the mercantile business at Venice. Mr. McBurney was a veteran of the Civil war. In politics he was a staunch Republican and had served as constable and held other township offices. He was a lifelong member of the Mount Pleasant United Presbyterian church.

Mr. McBurney had been remarkably successful in business and at the time of his death was the owner of a number of valuable farms and several residence properties in different sections of the county. He was a man who was popular with a wide circle of friends and was a particular favorite with the children of Hickory.

About 41 years ago Mr. McBurney was united in marriage with Miss Elizabeth Thompson who with one son Andrew T. McBurney, at home, survives. Mr. McBurney also leaves three sisters and two brothers: Mrs. Robert Thompson and Mrs. Martha McIlvaine of Houston; Mrs. Sarah Jeffrey, of Canonsburg; Ezra McBurney, of Cherry Valley, and W. A. McCalmont, all of Hickory, and Florence, wife of Oliver B. Robin- son, of McDonald, R. D. 4.

Mr. McCalmont was one of a family of 11 brothers and sisters, and of them two survive: Mrs. Agnes Lindsay of Houston and Mrs. Maude McCabe, of Hickory. Five grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2:30 p. m., E. S. T., in Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian Church, Hickory, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. R. L. Stevenson, assisted by the Rev. C. S. Hickory, Sept. 16.—Having been critically ill since stricken by paralysis two months ago while returning from the Gettysburg battlefield celebration, John Henderson McCalmont, a Civil war veteran and one of the most prominent citizens of Mt. Pleasant township, died at his home near here this morning at 12:15 o'clock. He would have been 69 years old in December.

Mr. McCalmont served in the Civil war as a member of Company D, 110th Pennsylvania Volunteer infantry. He was not taken ill until he had arrived at McDonald on his homeward journey. He left McDonald on a Friday evening to walk home and suffered a stroke between that place and his home. He wandered about for a whole day not reaching his own home until Saturday evening. His condition was critical and never improved.

Mr. McCalmont was a member of a pioneer family of this part of Washington county. He died on the farm where his birth occurred. His father, John McCalmont, was also born and lived his entire life near here. His mother was Mary Moore McCalmont. He was married to Miss Elizabeth McConnell, of Cecil township, who survives with one son Wilbur and one daughter Rachel May.

The subject of this notice lived her allotted time—almost "her three score and ten years,"—in this vicinity, the place of her birth and that of her death being not more than two miles apart. She was both well known and very generally respected. She was baptized in her infancy in the Associate congregation of Mt. Pleasant, made a public profession of her faith early in life in connection with the same congregation, and at the time of her death was a highly respected member of the United Presbyterian, successor to the Associate, congregation of Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian church, this place, died Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. H. Elliott, in Avalon. Her death was sudden, being caused by a stroke of apoplexy.

Mrs. McConnell, whose maiden name was Agnes McKittrick, was born in Londonderry, Ohio, September 2, 1843. In 1865 she was married to Rev. W. A. McConnell, who had been called to the pastorate of the Mt. Pleasant Presbyterian church this place and had resided here until about one year ago when she went to make her home with her daughter.

DR. JOSEPH McELROY SUMMONED BY DEATH

Aged Physician and Lifelong
Resident of Hickory Section
Passes Away at the Age of
85 Years.

1836—1922

Hickory, Feb. 22.—Dr. Joseph McElroy, aged 85 years, one of the oldest and most prominent physicians of Washington county, passed away at his home here at 4 a. m. today from a general break-down due to his advanced age. He had practiced medicine in this community for 52 years, and had completed more than half a century as a member of the Washington County Medical society. At the time of his death he was the oldest doctor in the county still engaged in active practice and the oldest active member of the Washington County Medical society.

Dr. McElroy's splendid constitution carried him well up into his eighties with more strength and better health than many men enjoy in the sixties. Until a few weeks before the end he was able to be about the office in which he was the senior partner of Dr. R. E. Conner. Until great weakness forced him to give it up he was as active in his profession as his years permitted. On Sunday, February 12, he became the courageous patient, lovable in weakness as he had always been in strength. A clean and temperate life, combined with great reserve strength, prolonged his life 10 days even though he lay prostrate.

Joseph McElroy was the fifth and youngest child of Alexander and Jane McDowell McElroy and was born on his father's farm three miles southwest of Hickory on November 14, 1836. He attended the schools of his day, graduated from a normal school in 1858, and later taught 10 years at Hickory and Cherry Valley, working on the farm during the long intermissions. His medical career, although it lasted more than half a century, was not begun until he was well past 30. In those days it was the custom of students to read medicine with a practitioner, and the late Dr. David M. McCarrell was Joseph McElroy's instructor. This was supplemented by a regular course of study at what is now Western Reserve university of Cleveland, from which institution he was graduated in 1869.

Dr. McElroy began his practice as a partner of Dr. McCarrell. Falling health necessitated the retirement of Dr. McCarrell and about 1887 Dr. Charles L. Campbell became Dr. McElroy's partner. This firm continued until 1897 when Dr. Campbell removed to Corliss where he still practices. In May of 1897, Dr. R. E. Conner became the junior member of the firm, and this partnership has just now been terminated by the passing of the one who gave more than half a century of his life to this community as a minister of mercy.

During the "flu" epidemic of 1918-19 Dr. McElroy labored with great heroism. He drove every day on his rounds, and in the evening bore what share he could of the rush calls. When some one afterward expressed amazement that he could stand so much, he said simply: "I don't know how I did it, but I did it."

Even to the time of his departure, and more especially in his younger days, he was active in every movement calculated to improve his town and the community. He was one of the founders of the Hickory academy, in its time a highly useful institution. In his profession he ranked high because he kept pace with the advancement in medical science. Nothing was a greater delight to him than to meet medical students, and budding physicians. To these he gave splendid counsel as to the management of cases, and in return he found out what he wanted to know about new methods. The Washington County Medical society had in him its oldest member, and his friendship among doctors everywhere was limited only by the number who had met him.

Friends of Dr. McElroy traced in him a resemblance to the late Erasmus Wilson, so greatly mourned in Western Pennsylvania. Their professions were utterly different, but each was a splendid figure of a man physically, a scholarly gentleman of the old school, liberal, gracious, respected by all and loved by most.

This was a long and honorable membership in the Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian church, lasting between 60 and 70 years. Whenever it was possible he was in his pew at the hour of worship. He especially enjoyed the Bible school. He was a man of prayer. He was an undemonstrative man, not given to public remarks. What he was, made words superfluous.

Dr. McElroy was a versatile man, his general knowledge being far above the average, and his tastes varied. He read the best literature with appreciation. From his mother he inherited a strong love of music. Even to his last days he wrote a fine hand. Entertainments appealed to him if they were of high character. He was an enthusiastic hunter in his younger days, and an ardent fisherman until enfeebled by age. His garden was a delight to him. Withal he practiced the simple life, cared nothing at all for show, and nothing at all for wealth beyond his needs. "Live and let live," became with him, "Live and help others to live happily."

To ride with him as he went on a call was a rare privilege. He liked the company and rewarded his companion with the fellowship of his delightful personality.

Dr. McElroy was married on May 1, 1873, to Margaret Brown, who survives him, together with two daughters, Mrs. Lella B. Kithcart, of Steubenville, Ohio, and Mrs. W. C. Moore, of Hickory, and one grandson, William McElroy Moore.

Funeral services will be held at his late home at Hickory on Friday, February 24, at 2 p. m. Interment will be in the Mt. Pleasant cemetery of this place.

ESTEEMED WOMAN OF HICKORY PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Margaret Brown McElroy
Aged 78 Years, Widow of
Dr. Joseph McElroy, Dies
After Brief Illness.

1848—1926

Hickory, July 11.—Mrs. Margaret Brown McElroy, aged 78 years, widow of Dr. Joseph McElroy, passed away at her home here at 7:30 o'clock Saturday night, after a brief illness. She was one of the most widely known and most highly esteemed of the older women of Washington county, where she had lived practically her entire life, and had fulfilled the duties of a physician's wife for more than half a century.

Mrs. McElroy, who was the only daughter of the late David and Rebecca Borland Brown, was born near Noblestown, Allegheny county, in September, 1848, and was the last survivor of that family. Her brother, Matthew H. Brown, of near Hickory, passed away slightly more than a year ago. The mother died when Mrs. McElroy was a small child, and shortly afterward the father and children moved to the Mt. Pleasant township farm which was Mrs. McElroy's home, except for the period of her attendance at Beaver college, until her marriage to Dr. Joseph McElroy, of Hickory, on May 1, 1872.

Taking up the duties of a physician's wife with the enthusiasm and good cheer and fine understanding which marked her character, she was for more than 50 years a tower of strength to Dr. McElroy, to the merits of whose service there are many to testify.

Joining the Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian church as a girl, under the pastorate of the late Dr. W. A. McConnell, Mrs. McElroy was long a teacher in the Sunday school, and always remembered with affection the boys who had been under her. Her interest in all the affairs of the church was keen, her fidelity recognized and her generosity well known.

Surviving Mrs. McElroy are two daughters, Mrs. Lella M. Kithcart, of Steubenville, O., and Mrs. W. C. Moore, of this place; and one grandson, Billy Moore.

the Rev. John McMillan founder of
Jefferson college, pioneer preacher of

his grandmother, who was a sister of
the Rev. John McMillan.

Gawin McIlvaine was a soldier in
the War of 1812 and witnessed the
surrender of the British fleet on Lake
Erie. He also deserved the distinc-
tion of having been a member of the
first temperance society ever formed
in Washington county. In his days
there were few teetotalers and John
McIlvaine was very proud that his
father was among the first to take
a stand on the whiskey question
which is so much before the people of
today.

Grandson of Pioneer

Mr. McIlvaine was a grandson of
Greer McIlvaine, who settled in Wash-
ington county in the year 1785, having
come from Hopewell township, Cum-
berland county. In 1837 Mr. McIl-
vaine moved with his father to the
Hickory neighborhood where he had
since lived. He was united in mar-
riage with Margaret Ann Carter a
daughter of William and Ann Carter
who came from Scotland to Mt. Pleas-
ant township. Three children were
born to this union, two of whom are
living. They are Mrs. William Small,
of Washington, and Miss Mellie McIl-
vaine, who resided with her aged
father. Mrs. McIlvaine died in 1864.
He also leaves six grandchildren.

Died, Feb. 16th, 1864, of inflammation of the lungs, Jas. H. Russell, at the residence of his father, Andrew Russell, near Hickory, Pa., aged 20 years, 11 months and 28 days.

The subject of the above notice was attacked by lung fever, in November, and after some time, apparently, he recovered without much medical aid, and the week previous to his relapse, was able to visit some of his friends. But on the first of February he suddenly relapsed and sunk rapidly, the violence of his disease setting at defiance all medical skill and the gentle nursing of tender friends, until, on the afternoon of the 16th of February, he fell asleep. James was a good boy; although he had not as yet regularly connected himself with the church, yet he openly professed Christ in his afflictions and when in health, he was a regular and attentive hearer and reader of the word of God. He was frequently heard at prayer, and in his affliction wished others to pray with and for him. As he drew near his last, he frequently repeated portions of the 23d Psalm, and called upon his heavenly Father. On the morning of his death he called his parents, brothers and sisters to his side, and desired them to kiss him and bid him a last farewell on earth. A few minutes before his departure, he told his father he was dying; and to the question, if it is God's will are you willing to die, he replied, "certainly." Russell—April 25, 1891, at his late home in Houstonville, Pa., Mr. Andrew Russell, in the 76th year of his age.

An active, busy life has closed. A friend and helper of everything that was good has gone from among us.

Mr. Russell was born in Washington co., in the year 1815, on the old Russell homestead, now occupied by his brother John. He remained there until he grew up to manhood. In the year 1839 he was married to Miss Jane Miller. Shortly after their marriage they moved to Mt. Pleasant tp., near Hickory, Pa., and there they were permitted to live, in the goodness of God, until after they had celebrated their fiftieth anniversary. They were given ten children, seven of whom, three sons and four daughters, are still living, and with the mother mourn his loss.

About two years ago, feeling they had toiled long enough on the farm, Mr. Russell bought a neat and comfortable home in Houstonville, thinking that there they could spend the rest of their days in ease. Into this home they moved last fall, and only a few months rolled by until a severe cold seized Mr. Russell, and it soon developed into pneumonia, and all the care and medical skill possible could not check its progress; the disease steadily worked away, gaining ground all the time. Though the disease had a strong constitution to master, it at last proved the victor, and in less than six months from the time he entered his new home to rest, he was borne by angel hands to a better resting place than earth can give.

Of his Christian character all who knew him testify in the highest terms. He united with the church, making a public profession of his faith in the Chartiers United Presbyterian church, at the age of 18. In the spring of 1839 he, with his wife, united with the Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian church, and there for more than fifty years they communed with God and each other. At the time of his death he was a member of the First United Presbyterian church Houstonville, Pa. During all these years he manifested an earnest Christian life. He loved the house of God, and delighted to engage in worship with the people of God. He was one who could say, "For me to live is Christ."

He was engaged in general farming all his life, and specialized in fine livestock. He was always a member of the Republican Party, but never sought public office. Early in life he united with Mt. Pleasant United Presbyterian Church of Hickory, and was a loyal supporter, faithful in attendance as long as his health permitted.

Mr. Russell married Anna M. Agnew, of Chartiers Township, May 26, 1887, and to that union three children were born: Johnston M. Russell now residing in Mt. Pleasant Township; Mrs. Anna Russell Dunlap, of Houston, and Andrew McElroy Russell, who died in infancy. Mrs. Russell died in May of 1899.

In September of 1903, Mr. Russell married Anna Criqueillon of Mt. Pleasant Township, who survives. To that union was born one son, J. Lawrence Russell, who survives, residing in Mt. Pleasant Township.

Also surviving, besides his wife, two sons, one daughter and one sister, are five grandchildren.

Hickory, Feb. 21—Mrs. Margaretta Smith Russell, aged 76, died at her home here this afternoon of cerebral hemorrhage. She had apparently been in her usual health, and as a result her death comes as a shock to her many friends.

Mrs. Russell was born in Cherry Valley, October 12, 1850, a daughter of Ebenezer and Margaret Lyle Smith. October 12, 1876, she married Andrew Russell, a prominent farmer of Mt. Pleasant township.
