
Avella Couple Celebrate 60th Wedding Anniversary

I. E. Asbury 1s Dead; Leading Barber Here

Isaac E. Asbury, 81, for half a century the proprietor of one of Washington's leading barber shops died at 2:30 a. m. yesterday in Washington Hospital after an illness of two months, While his health had not been good since he retired from business almost two years ago he was able to go about until two months ago when he fell and fractured his hip in his home. Since then he had been confined to the hospital.

The death of Isaac Asbury marks the passing of one of the prominent members of the Negro race in Washington, where he had lived for 57 years. He was a native of historic West Middletown, noted as Abolition headquarters in the days of the Underground Railway before the Civil War. He was born there June 6, 1864, a son of the late John and Narcissa Adams Asbury. His young life was spent in that community, where he worked on the farm and at odd jobs. He went to Waynesburg, where he worked as a waiter in the old Downey House. He then entered the barber shop of D. A. Ferrell, Waynesburg, as an apprentice. Three years were spent there, after which he came to Washington where he was employed for five years in the shop of S. W. Dorsey, in the Auld House.

Always of an ambitious disposition, Mr. Asbury decided to start in business for himself, and on June 28, 1893, opened his own shop in the basement of Hotel Main, which stood on the site of the Washington Union Trust Building. After this historic hotel was burned in the early morning of January 6, 1899, he opened his shop in a room just across Beau street, where he remained until the present building was completed. Then he moved back to his former site and in the new building opened one of the most up-to-date shops in this section of the State; and there he remained until he retired from business more than 40 years later.

Mr. Asbury was always proud of the fact that it was the fate E. F. Acheson, former editor of The Observer and Congressman from this district, who gave him his chance to start in business. He needed \$500 with which to purchase the barber shop in Hotel Main, but he did not have the money. However, Mr. Acheson came to his aid with a loan of \$500; and Mr. Asbury was always proud of the fact that no note or security was asked for or given. It was just a "gentlemen's agreement," but Mr. Acheson knew the type of man with whom he was dealing and that \$500 was paid from the first profits of the shop. His business prospered from the first, and "Ike" Asbury's shop soon became known as Washington's "nobbiest tonsorial establishment," a position it held during more than 50 years. He remained in this same location until he retired on February 1, 1944, at which time the business passed into the hands of Miller Brothers.

In reminiscing over those 50 years when he retired, Mr. Asbury spoke of the changes in the business. When he started a shave was 10 cents and a hair cut 25 cents. The shop was open from early in the morning until as late as there was a customer, and this often meant midnight. In those days the barber shop was the local club of its customers. There they heard the news of the day, played checkers, often joined in the "barber shop quartet," and there was always at least one of the barbers who could play a guitar or banjo.

Always a leader of his race in this community he took a deep interest in civic affairs, and did much for his people in Washington. He was a member of the St. Paul African Methodist Episcopal Church for many years. He was one of the charter members of Lodge No. 77, Free and Accepted Masons, and was prominent in McFarland Lodge 2802, and of Washington Patriochy No. 136, Grand United Order of Odd Fellows. He was a leader in this order in Pennsylvania and served two terms as state grand master.

On October 25, 1894, he was united in marriage with Miss Josephine Viney, a native of Circleville, Ohio, whose stepfather, the Rev. R. H. Morris, was at that time pastor of the St. Paul Methodist Episcopal Church. Just a year ago they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Besides his wife, he is survived by several nieces and nephews. He was the last member of his family. A brother, John Asbury, who died two years ago, was a practicing attorney for many years in Philadelphia and served three terms in the Pennsylvania Legislature. **Dewey-Scott**







This Huge Water Bug Caught And Killed Crawfish In Creek

Mrs. Leo Rosati, of Woodrow. recently found and sent to The Observer for identification a large insect which was identified by Dr. C. D. Dieter, of the Washington and Jefferson College biology department, as an unusually large specimen of fairly common giant water bug. Because of its size, however. Dr. Dieter regarded it as a valuable specimen for the college biological collection.

Mrs. Rosati said that the bug. which she found swimming under water, had caught and killed a crawfish and that when she removed it from the water it started to fly away, carrying its prey. Its front legs, she said, were like hooks holding the crawfish.

Dr. Dieter says this water bug is an insect closely related to the electric light bug, but is amphibious in that it lives in and near the water. Usually it swims on the sur face, but when it dips under water to catch food it stores air for breathing in pockets under its front men, such as the one found by





Ellwood H. Fulton Fatally Injured

County Farm Agent Is Found Dead In His Home Here

County Farm Agent Ellwood H. Fulton, 50, was found dead last night at the foot of the cellar stairs in his home, 508 East Wheeling street, the victim of an accidental discharge of a shotgun, according to a report by Deputy Coroner G. E. McNary, who was called to the scene of the fatal accident.

The deputy coroner, testing the death weapon, found that it has a hair trigger and can be discharge ed on slight impact. Mr. Fulton had been doing practice shooting over the past several weeks and it is believed he went to the cellar. carrying the gun, possibly stum-bled and the weapon was discharged, the shot catching him in the throat.

Mr. and Mrs. William H. Carson, who made their home with Mr. Fulton for several months, or shortly after the death of Mrs. Fulton August 29, 1945, had left the house about 7:40 o'clock to attend the football game at the Washington High School stadium. Mr. Fulton, according to Mr. Carson said he had a couple of telephone calls to make and a meeting to attend and that he would be unable to go to the game.

Returning home shortly arter 10:30 o'clock, Mr. and Mrs. Carson busied themselves about the home and Mrs. Carson went to the head of the cellar stairs. Turning on the light she saw the body of Mr. Fulton crumpled at the foot

of the stairs. City Police and Deputy Glenn E. McNary were called and the body was removed to the Bebout and

McNary Funeral Home.

Mr. Fulton had been Farm Agent for Washington County since his graduation from Penn State College more than 25 years ago and was well known throughout the County.

He was born September 15, 1896, the son of the late Robert D. and Mary Moore Fulton, North Strabane Township. He attended public school in that district, graduated from North Strabane High School, attended Washington and Jefferson College for two years and completed his education at

In addition to his duties County Farm Agent he was active in the life of the community. He was a member of the Second Presbyterian Church, a member of the Men's Bible Class and past president of the Brotherhood of the church. He was also a past president of Washington Kiwanis Club, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Washington County Motor Club and United States Department of Agriculture.

Surviving are a half-brother and half-sister, James R. Fulton, Can-onsburg, R. D. 2 and Mrs. Marga-

ret Reese, State College.



He had followed farming all his life and had always taken an active part in affairs related to agriculture, especially the Washington County Agricultural Extension Association.






General View Of Damage At Street Intersection In Burgettstown











Homes, Buildings And Orchards Are Leveled In Burgettstown Area

Storm Pictures Pages 3 and 13

Sweeping across northwestern Washington County, from Eldersville into the Raccoon district, a tornado snuffed out two lives and spread destruction throughout the area shortly after 2 o'clock Tuesday morning. Houses and farm buildings were levelled or damaged and trees uprooted or broken off along the entire path of the storm.

The storm attained a velocity equal to that of the similar disastrous windstorm of June 23, 1944, which struck parts of both Washington and Greene Countiess, causing a death toll

of 26.

Fatally crushed as their homes toppled upon them as they slept were:

JOHN J. BRENNA, 65, near Eldersville ,who was found dead in the ruins of his small home.

THEODORE VUNKA, 62, Eldersville road, who was so terribly crushed by a falling brick wall that he died while being removed to Washington Hospital.

Burgettstown was hit with devastating force, the Glenn Nicholls machine shop and the Frank Pappas lumber yard being practically demolished as well as a dozen or more homes adly damaged.

Sweeping with a velocity of 80 or more miles an hour. ne tornado levelled half a dozen homes and caused varying amage to dozens more.

KE WAR, SAYS VETERAN

Gene Karach, of near Eldersville, a veteran of amphibian acks in the Pacific Islands, in describing the storm said:

'It was just like being in an invasion. Everything was ppening and you didn't have the slightest idea what was ng to happen next. You just waited. The storm hit with lighty swoop and then was gone.

Telephone and power lines were down throughout the ict and crews of the Bell Telephone Company and the Power Company rushed into the district on emergy calls to help restore disrupted services.

Pennsylvania State Policemen were among the first on the ene and toured the entire district, seeing that assistance needd was forthcoming. Red Cross representatives hurried to the

Relatives and friends of those suffering losses and many others hurried to the scene yesterday morning, most of them to offer their services. Last night the highway into the district was congested by automobile traffic as thousands of persons visited the stricken areas.

The path of the storm was not more than 300 feet wide but all objects in its path felt its fury. Hundreds of trees were uprooted, orchards were destroyed and woodlands levelled as

it swept through the area.

'I saw the tornado approaching," said Scott Colbert, Eldersville.

"It approached Eldersville from the general direction of Follansbee. I had been in tornadoes in the West, I watched the big white cloud, black on the upper edges and tapering toward the bottom sweeping along at great speed. neared us, Mrs. Colbert and I started for the cellar. was a terrific roar. It seemed to last less than two minutes."

In Eldersville, an average farm barn on the R. A. Stewart farm, on the outskirts of the village was levelled. The garage of William Sanders was completely destroyed. Weigmann barn was unroofed and a chicken house razed.

Windows were shattered and the roof damaged at the Raymond Kidd property, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. John Harris and child. The roof of the William Sanders home was damaged.

Two windows were broken in the Eldersville school.

STORM DIPPED AND WEAVED

From Eldersville, the storm crossed and recrossed the Eldersville-Burgettstotwn road, dipping and weaving. were uprooted in fields. Corn was levelled and gardendamaged.

The next homes in its path, after leaving Eldersville, were those of Charles Karch and Osman Dervis. Windows were shattered and the roof torn from the residence and 40 to 60 trees, many fruit, were uprooted on the Karch farm. The front porch was torn off the Dervis home and a chicken house destroyed.

REMARKABLE ESCAPE

Memebrs of the Ray Jackson family, neighbors of the Karches, had a remarkable escape. Mr. and Mrs. Jackson. their daughter, Catherine, 17, and their grandchild, Lorraine, 7, were in the house. The roar of the approaching storm had awakened the household. Mr. and Mrs. Jackson were up closing windows and securing doors.

The four-room residence was lifted from its foundation and carried fully 25 feet. It was shattered, torn apart seem.

ingly in midair.

HOUSE CARRIED AWAY

'I heard glass shatter," said Mrs. Jackson. "Then it sounded like pebbles were being blown against the side of the house. I started for the bathroom. Then everything seemed to go blank. When I became aware of my surroundings I was still standing at the same spot on the floor, but the house had been carried off the foundation. Our home and furnishings were strewn about us."

Little Lorraine Jackson was found more than 35 feet from the site of the home. She apparently had been blown out of the house and then dropped in a pool of water in the muddy lougher ground of the garden

BURGETTSTOWN, Oct. 8—Sale of the Washington National Bank of Burgettstown to the Citizens National Bank of Washington, a member of the Mellbank Group, has been proposed and will be presented for ratification at a special meeting of shareholders which has been called for 2 p. m. Friday, Oct. 31 at the bank.

Terms of the proposed sale call for the Citizens National Bank to pay \$462,000 in cash for the 500 shares of stock. \$925 a share, and to assume all liabilities of the institution.



Broken Body Is Found In Cross Creek Township

Money and Watch Found, Indicating No Foul Play Involved

State Police early this morning said the victim of an alleged hit run driver had been identified as Willis Kepler, 74, a farmhand, employed by Mont Lee, of Cross Creek Township, Burgettstown, R. D. 2.

The broken body of an elderly man, not identified, was found along a state road in Cross Creek Township last night and police authorities said the man "undoubtedly" was killed by a hit-run motorist.

Sgt. H. A. Gidley, of the State Police, and Deputy Coroner H. R. Wilson, who joined troopers in the investigation, said there was "little doubt the man was run down by a hit-run driver. It looked like the man had been dragged along the road."

The body, lying in the snow along the Atlasburg Cedar Grove road, near the home of J. D. Townsend, Cross Creek Township, was found at 8:20 p.m. by Charles Schulte, of Cross Creek,

Schulte told authorities he was en route to work at the Aliquippa plant of Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. when he saw the man's body lying along the road.

Schulte said he went to the Townsend residence and notified State Police.

Deputy Coroner Wilson said the man suffered fractures of both legs, a fractured skull, probable internal injuries and a large, deep laceration on the left hip.

The body was taken to the Lee & Wilson Funeral Home, Burgettstown, where efforts were being made to establish identification.

Harold Stritzinger, Cross Creek Township police officer, was summoned and he said he did not know the man.

There were no cards or papers on the man's person to aid in identifying him. Sgt. Gidley reported. An Elgin pocket watch was found in his clothes and also a billfold containing \$59 in currency, eliminating any possibility of foul play.

Peter J. Knish Dies In Mishap At Canonsburg

Truck and Train In Collision At East Pike Crossing

Peter John Knish, 28, of West Middletown, was killed instantly Thursday afternoon in the collission of his truck and a Pennsylvania Railroad passenger train at the East Pike street crossing in Canonsburg.

Borough Police and Deputy Corfoner John F. Yoney, who investigated, said the fatal accident occurred at 3.09 p. m., shortly after the Pittsburgh-bound train had left the Canonsburg Station at Jefferson avenue, four blocks away.

Knish, an independent truck owner hauling a load of coal, was also traveling east and his truck had almost cleared the four-truck crossing when the engine struck the back of the truck, investigators

The truck was flung broadside against a crossing flasher pole on the east side of the tracks and Knish was pinned in the cab of the truck.

Knish suffered a fractured skull and was badly mangled. He died instantly and it was some time before rescuers could extricate the body from the wreckage. Three tons of coal were spilled along the tracks and part of the crossing.

Knish, in the trucking business for nine years, was hauling coal for the Patsch Coal Company from its operation above Houston to the company's tipple at the old Buffalo mine to be loaded on coal cars.

There were conflicting reports as to whether the flasher lights were working at the time of the accident and authorities said a thorough investigation would be conducted.

Police Chief James Haney reported the engineer of the train was N. W. Zellars, of Cross Creek, and the conductor was W. J. Brown, of Carnegie.


