Threshes Wheat Earliest In His 55 Years As Thresherman In County

Elisha Craft, of Independence, one of the veteran threshermen of Pennsylvania, started this year, his 55th, by threshing this field of wheat at the earliest date in his long career. On Wednesday, June 24, he threshed wheat for George Ralston and George Mc-Fadden. The golden grain is not usually cut until about July 4, but this year wheat is being harvested weeks earlier than usual, many fields already being in shock. Craft is of the opinion that few threshermen in Pennsylvania or West Virginia have been in the business as long as he has, and the earliest he has threshed before this year was on July 5, 1898. He says that the wheat crop this year is very good, but will be hard to thresh, due to long straw and the fact that heavy straw and wet weather combined to lay it on the ground. Prospects are also big for a good oats crop, he said.



Auto Taken At Hickory Crashes Near Carnegie

Driver Instantly Killed In Wreck During Chase By Police July 21 LOCAL MAN OWNER

A Washington man's automobile stolen from Hickory last night crashed against a pole near Carnegie during a wild chase by police, killing the driver and totally wrecking the car.

Patrolman Ed Wolf, of Bridgeville, who pursued the stolen car for four miles at speeds ranging past 80 miles an hour from the center of Bridgeville to the eldge of Carnegie, said papers found on the person of the dead man bore the name of James F. Holleran, of Oakland, Pittsburgh. He said the man was about 35 years old.

The car was owned by Cyril Davidson, of 990 Arch street, Washington.

State Motor Police of the Washington detachment said Davidson drove to Hickory last night, parked his car there, and entered a barber shop. About 8:40 Davidson, still in the barber shop, saw his car being driven away and rushed out into

the street, the officers reported. The car went about a block down the street, turned around and started back past the barber shop. Davidson tried to flag it to a halt. but the car speeded up and he barely managed to leap to one side in time to avoid being run down.

Davidson and another man hurried into the latter's car and gave chase, but lost track of the stolen car, halted, and called the State Police station in Washington, giving a description of the car and reporting it was being driven from Hickory toward Bridgeville.

State Motor Police here promptly notified Bridgeville police, and Patrolman Ed Wolf was stationed with the police car at one of the main intersections in Bridgeville to halt the stolen machine.

Wolf, contacted by telephone last night, said he was on foot when the stolen car approached, and that when he tried to wave it to a stop it speeded up and he was forced to leap to one side to avoid being run over. He immediately leaped into the police car and gave chase, he reported.

The two cars raced through Bridgeville and for almost four miles on toward Carnegie at speeds that ranged to 80 miles an hour or more. Patrolman Wolf reported he was just pulling out his revolver to take a shot at a tire on the fleeing car when it was unable to negotiate a curve because of its high speed, swerved over a curb at one side of the highway, careened across the road, and crashed against a power line pole on the other side near the Clark High School.

The officer said the car was totally wrecked, and that the driver was apparently instantly killed. The pole was sheared off by the impact, and just after the driver's body had been removed from the wreckage the top half of the pole crashed down through the roof of the car, he stated.

Power lines on the pole were broken, throwing that neighborhood into darkness for a short time. Wolf, who has been on the Bridgeville police force about a year, had just returned to duty yes-

terday following a vacation.

He was born November 10, 1864, on Wheeling Island, Wheeling, W. Va., the son of Thomas W. and Nancy Nichol Blair.




Mrs. Hanna's mother, Mrs. Walter Denny, reached the age of 90 years.

Judge Howard W. Hughes Speaks At Cross Creek

Approximately 400 residents of the Cross Creek community attended the dedication of the district Honor Roll held last evening with Judge Howard W. Hughes, of Washington, delivering the dedicatory address.

The handsome sandstone arch on the property of historic Cross Creek Presbyterian Church was erected by citizens of the district. Some cash was collected but most of the work was done voluntarily. The community has 56 in service at the present time.

Judge Hughes paid tribute to those who have answered the call to the colors of their nation in the struggle against those powers opposed to the way of life of democracies but expressed the thought that even with a world federation of some sort that strife would follow in the form of civil wars.

"We have a long hard fight ahead to overcome our adversaries," Judge Hughes said. "When we have accomplished their defeat we cannot withdraw the boundaries of our nation and various states and let the rest of the world adjust itself. War is the outgrowth of society which can never be uniform but will vary with varying conditions of climate; land, race, religion and traditions. No superstate can prevent diversity nor prevent expressions of vigorous people."

Walter G. McNelly, chairman of the committee on dedication, presided. The invocation was offered by the Rev. Douglas S. Vance, pastor of the Cross Creek Church. Later, the Rev. Mr. Vance spoke and told of the letters of appreciation received by him from soldlers in which they related the value of the Testaments given them by the church when they left for service.

Owner Of Slovan Plant Faces 729 Alleged Violations

PITTSBURGH. Feb. 25. - A Washington County, meat packing was accused today of 139 violations of the Emergency Frice Control Act in a criminal complaint filed with the U.S. Commissioner by agents of the Office of Price Administration.

The complaint was filed against! John Delfrate, owner and manager of the Delfrate Packing Co., of Slovan, Pa., who, according to the OPA agents, transacts a big meat business throughout the Pittsburgh district.

A total of 124 counts charged Delfrate with selling and deliver-ing beef and veal carcasses and wholesale cuts, between Oct. 3 and Dec. 14, at prices exceeding the maximum limits.

The meat packer was accused of failing to specify on sales invoices grade and sex identification in

some 365 instances. Twenty charges concerned de-livery of sides of beef and billing the customer for its various parts.

In seven instances he was accused of selling and delivering beef and veal carcasses that had not been examined and graded by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

A total of 128 counts concerned the alleged "upgrading" of meat on invoices. There were three charges of short weight.

V. G. Grunewald signed the complaint. which was filed by Attorney Guy Hoge.

A bench warrant for Delfrate's arrest was expected to be issued later today.



Term As Judge In County 1 - 9-43 WAS 54 YEARS OLD

Judge Robert E. Burnside, 355 North Wade avenue, died last night at 10:45 o'clock in a Pittsburgh Hospital, to which he was removed several ago for treatment for a heart ailment from which he had been suffering for the past several months.

Judge Burnside, in his 55th year, had been in ailing health for months and had been unable to serve on the bench. His condition seemed to be improved recently and he was removed to the Pittsburgh institution in the hope that special treatments there would bring further improvement.

Coronary occlusion was the cause of death, it was stated.

Judge Burnside was elected to a seat on the bench of the Common Pleas Court of Washington County Nov. 7, 1939, having just entered upon the third year of a term of ten years.

Although his father was a member of one of the pioneer families of Chartiers Township, Judge-Burnside was born at New Wil-

mington Sept. 20, 1888, a son of James R. and Mary Prudence Eckles Burnside. His father was an outstanding member of the Washington Ear for many years.

Judge Burnside spent his boyhood and practically all of his life in Washington. After attending the Washington schools, he returned to New Wilmington to enroll as a student at Westminster College. Completing his studies there, he enrolled in the Law School of the University of Michigan. Graduating there in 1913, re returned to Washington and the following year started to practice law.

Judge Burnside and Miss Ethel Beacham, a teacher in the Washington schools, were married a few years after he started the practice of law here. Mrs. Burnside, also. decided to study law and was admitted to the Washington Bar, having the distinction of being the first woman attorney in Washington County. Both Judge and Mrs. Burnside qualified to appear before high state courts and the Supreme Court of the United States. Taking an active interest in politics, Judge Burnside was selected as a candidate for judge by his party in 1939 and with Judge Howard W. Hughes as a running mate was elected to the high office.

Judge Burnside was a member of the Bassett Club and the Nemacolin Country Club.

He was president of the congregation of the First U. P. Church.

In the practice of law, Judge Burnside was associated with Mrs. Burnside for several years under the firm name of Burnside & Burnside. Later, Attorney Russell Z. Moninger joined the firm and it became known as Burnside, Moninger & Burnside. Upon his election to the bench, Judge Burnside retired as a member of the firm.

Mrs. Burnside survives.

HEN Willard W. Welch, of Burgettstown, a short while ago sold his farm feed and supply business to the Washington County Farm Bureau Co-operative Association, he realized what had long been his ideal objective. "The idea had always been in my mind," writes Mr. Welch, "to either sell to a Co-op or establish a local county Co-operative simi-lar to the Farm Bureau. So, when on September 1, 1942, Mr. Green of the P.F.B.C.A. in one of his visits happened to mention that the Farm Bureau might be interested in this location, the deal was quickly made, and I am happy to say that I was hired to manage the branch."

The Welch business was origi-nally started as a Co-op. The old Pennsylvania Farmers' Co-operative Federation sold from the car from 1926 to 1928, when the father, M. Reed Welch, built the present building. The Co-op eventually went under, and M. Reed Welch continued in business with practically the same set-up as far as

margins and services were con-cerned. In 1940 Willward W. Welch bought the business from his father, and continued it under the name of the M. Reed Welch Co.

Thus the Washington County Farm Bureau Co-op has a branch with a well-established business; a manager with Co-operative idealism and practical business experi-ence—and the farmers in the Burgettstown area have a service that will expand with the coming years. 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

Apparently in his usual health during the early evening, his death came as a severe shock to his family and friends.

Mr. Sheaff was the son of Henry H. and Elizabeth Cook Sheaff and was born in Canonsburg on February 22, 1876. He had spent his entire life in Canonsburg where he was employed for several years by the Manufacturers Light and Heat Company, then with the Standard Tin Plate Company from 1918 until the mill was sold a few years ago.

The deceased was a lifelong Democrat, yet never held public office until he became a member of council by appointment follow-ing the death of his neighbor, Elmer Leach, in 1941. He was a charter member of Canon Lodge of the Knights of Pythias.

Known to his friends as "Cackle," he was one of the community's most esteemed men. He took an active part in all civic affairs and for many years was connected with all sports events of the dis-trict. He managed several of the leading baseball teams ever to play in Canonsburg.

The new investigator calls attention to the fact that only 16,000 dog licenses have been issued thus far this year as compared to better than 23,000 for the same period in 1942. Scores Of Victory Gardens Are Ruined--Farm Crops Damaged

ONE SMALL_'TWISTER'

Flash floods following extremely heavy downpours and a "small twister" near Hickory yesterday caused considerable damage in several sections of Washington County yesterday afternoon and last evening.

Heaviest damage was caused in western and northwestern districts. Cross Creek, Studa, Avella, Slovan and a section two miles north of Hickory seemingly bearing the brunt of sweeping storms. Electri-cal and telephone service was disrupted and impaired between Hickory and McDonald.

Lowlands in the vicinity of the Boy Scout Reservation, near Hackney station, were reported flooded and much water swept down the valley from Laboratory. The highest water in 15 years wes reported by resident of the Maiden street. Springfield avenue and Elm street sections.

The Walter C. Lee home, Cross Creek, reported the highest water since 1912 there with water over the Hickory-Cross Creek highway.

"A wall of water, just like a dam had let loose all at once, swept down upon us," Mrs. Jerry Bartamini, of Studa, stated last evening. "Our garage is seven feet high and water was up to the ceiling. I had to run at the last minute to escape," she said. Mrs. Bartamini had been taking some little chickens out of the path of the water.

At Slovan, which experienced two floods in less than 24 hours, a recently dedicated World War II Honor Roll was destroyed and other damage caused.

Reports indicated that hundreds of Victory Gardens in the area swept by the storm had been destroyed completely or badly damaged. Farmers in the areas, also, suffered some crop damage but were unable last evening to make any estimate of the extent they had been harmed.

A report from Studa stated that

cnickens, some dogs and pigs and even cows had been caught in the swirling waters of that branch of Cross Creek. The deluge was heavy over the whole valley but seemed to have been heaviest about Cross Creek and area adjoining.

Sweeping through Patterson Mill and other areas, the torrent of water in the Cross Creek valley bore down upon Avella and caused damage there, especially in the Browntown section. Members of the Avella Volunteer Fire Department and Civilian Defense Units were called out, the latter keeping traffic off roads threatened.

Old cars and scrap metal stored at the Avella Auto Wrecking yard were carried down stream. A Pittsburgh & West Virginia train was held up for half an hour. The basement of the Economy store at Avella was flooded for a time it was feared the bridge, near the store, would be carried away.

Young John Venitte was reported to have taken off his clothing to swim and wade out to rescue two dogs marooned in a tree.

Damage was caused at the Italian bakery in the Browntown district of Avella, but flour, sugar and other materials were saved. The SNPJ home there was flooded. Foot bridges across the stream in the Browntown district were carried out, isolating some families temporarily. Water was in the first floor of numerous homes.

A small section of a railroad siding was washed out and hundreds of dollars damage was caused by flood damage to gardens, many of which were washed out completely.

In the area just north of Hickory, along the Hickory-McDonald road, a severe wind, described by residents as a "twister," twisted off several trees and razed a shed on the Vance Smith farm, two miles north of Hickory. Two calves in the shed were unhurt.

Electricity in the same area was off for four hours, beginning about 5 o'clock, causing considerable inconvenience to dairy farmers using milking machines.

Fields were badly washed there, as in many other sections of the county.

A motorist who left the Scout camp just before the storm broke, however, said the valley was quickly flooded, and all the way to Washington he passed many cars which were compelled to stop. He said the creek at Harts Mills was also out of its banks. This man said the storm came into this county from Waynesburg and moved north to Washington.

In the Rea section it was reported that the rain was heavy, and that fields were washed considerably.

Locally, the storm apparently was concentrated in the vicinity of Laboratory and the Fifth Ward. Catfish Creek went on a rampage, some residents between Shrontz Lane and Elm street declaring the stream was out of its banks the 'worst in many years.' Little damage was reported, however.

Gardens in low grounds below Dunn avenue as far as Elm street were washed badly, and water flowed into cellars of several homes on the north side of Springfield avenue near Elm street.

The cloudburst missed the Chartiers Valley area, including the pump station of Citizens Water-Company, where the precipitation registered only .4 of an inch.

Wettest July In **943** Local History Has Come To Its Close

The wettest July on record here came to an end Saturday midnight.

The flood producing rains of last Tuesday, when 2.12 inches of rain fell, and Wednesday, when 1.33 inches more came down, contributed considerably less than half the month's rainfall, although the two days produced almost as much rainfall as in the average July.

Though total figures were not available last night, it is believed that the year's precipitation to date is far above normal and perhaps approximates a record.

Commissioners Plan To Sell Coal Lands

Petition Is Filed In Federal Court, Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURGH. June 26.—(AP)— Commissioners of Washington County today petitioned Federal Court for permission to take possession and sell the real estate of the Duquesne Coal & Coke Co. and the Bertha Consumers Co. for nonpayment of taxes.

The commissioners said they purchased both properties at treasurer's sales. The Duquesne Coal & Coke Co. now is in possession of S. W. Blakslee, trustee. and the Bertha Consumers Co. is in the hands of John H. Jones, receiver.

The Bertha Consumers Co. was sold by the Washington County Treasurer to Washington County on January 23, 1940, for non-payment of county, road and school taxes in the amount of \$72,492.92, covering 1927 to 1934, inclusive. The Commissioners said the company also has unpaid and delinquent taxes of \$31,910.47 from 1935 to 1941, inclusive.

On April 25, 1940, the County Commissioners purchased the Duquesne Coal & Coke Company's real estate for back taxes totalling \$40,349.62, covering 1931 to 1934, inclusive. The petitioners said today the Duquesne Company has unpaid and delinquent taxes of \$45,130.33 for 1935-41, inclusive.

Property of the companies was listed as follows:

Bertha Consumers Co. — 635 acres coal, 307 acres surface, three generators. 107 houses. tipple, substation, shop, fan, etc., near Burgettstown.

Duquesne Coal & Coke Co.-1,413 acres coal, 514 acres surface, tipple, powerhouse, shop, 43 shanties, 38 houses, plant, boarding house, several boilers, two generators, fans, company houses, etc., in the Avella district.

Sale Of Mine Held By County Bertha Coal Plant Now Property Of West Virginia Man

Court Approves

In an order handed down after a hearing yesterday, the Federal Court in Pittsburgh approved sale of the Bertha coal mine in Jefferson Township by the Washington County Commissioners to Marsall Jones, a coal operator of Fairmont, W. Va., for \$40,000.

The new owner was reliably reported to be planning to reopen and operate the mine, which has been idle for about 12 years.

Washington County took over the mine for unpaid taxes in 1940, and recently arranged the sale to the West Virginia operator, but Federal Court approval was necessary because the 300 acres of coal lands were held in an out-of-state receivership.

Tax claims against the property have been filed by the Federal and State governments, in addition to the County, and they were referred to a special master who will decide the priority of the claims. The mine has been in receivership since 1928.

Loss To Crops And Property Is Very Extensive

Ten County Bridges Out—Lightning Causes Destruction

LIVESTOCK, IS LOST 7-28-443 Reports of damage from the cloudburst which swept this county Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning continued to flow in yesterday and last night, indicating that loss would total many thousands of dollars to farm crops, and thousands more to other property.

Officials of the Tygart Valley Glass Company stated last night that their damage would mount to well over \$50,000. All cardboard cartons and other equipment stored in the basement were totally destroyed.

In the worst affected areas virtually all gardens in lowlands were either destroyed or very badly damaged; cornfields were washed and the corn blown over and pushed to the earth by the weight of the falling rain; oats which were still uncut were so badly fallen that it will be difficult to raise them with the binder.

them with the binder. Reports indicated that in the smaller valleys virtually every fence crossing a stream was swept away, and some farmers spent much of the day hunting the streams for gates and other property.

Wheat and oats in shock were soakad, and much was blown or washed away.

County Agent E. H. Fulton last night said that much of the flattened corn would come up again, but thought most of it would yield a much reduced crop. Much sweet corn knocked down, however, was ready to pollinate and this process will be prevented to a large extent.

The State Highway Department reported seven bridges washed clear out on its roads in the county. These included one at the Litle farm on Route 62135, from Sunset Beach to Prosperity; one on Route 62138 between Prosperity and Sparta; one on Route 62102, near the Mt. Herman Church, on the road from Mt. Herman to Van Buren; a covered bridge on Route 62115, near Buffalo Creek, on the road between Claysville and Acheson Station; an 82-foot steel truss bridge an Route 62119 between ----

Taylorstown and Brush Run; a 79 foot steel truss bridge on Route 62110, between Taylorstown and Acheson, reported "just hanging there", and a 50-foot steel truss bridge on Route 62109, between Route 40 and Brush Run.

Approaches were washed away from three other bridges. These included a steel truss bridge over Buffalo Creek on Route 62109; a covered bridge on Route 62111, between West Alexander and Dunsfort, and a bridge on Route 62135, between Taylorstown and Sunset Beach.

A section of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, near Taylorstown, was swept out, and between the State line and Elm Grove another 1,500 feet of track was swept away. No trains ran for 12 hours.

The Green Valley Inn, near Taylorstown, was moved from its foundation, and 500 chickens were lost when a brooder house nearby was washed away.

Lightning struck and burned a large frame barn on the T. W. Sickles farm, near Westland. Hay and grain in the barn were destroyed, but livestock was saved, except one calf. Trees blown across the road delayed Houston firemen, who were able to do nothing to save the barn. This was the second barn burned on this farm, and two years ago lightning destroyed the house.

Lightning struck a tenant house on the E. O. Parkinson farm, at Old Concord, but Claysville firemen were able to confine damage to a charred roof and chimney.

to a charred roof and chimney. Twelve beef cattle on the Charles Stine farm, near Taylorstown, were killed by lightning, and John S. Wright, Taylorstown, lost 12 sheep in the flood.

Some of the heaviest flood damage was at Sunset Beach, bathing resort on Route 40, where flood waters of the creek swept part of the bath house across the pool and left it badly wrecked, and did severe damage to other equipment

At Canonsburg, where the lower parts of the town were flooded, excavations for the new plant of the Aluminum Company of America were flooded, and construction work was seriously hampered.

Repair crews and linemen of the West Penn Power Company and Bell Telephone Company spent a busy day yesterday making repairs to lines, transformers and substations, and checking connections and equipment. By night, however, practically all service was restored, though much repair work remained to be done. In many places floods covered roads, and traffic was interrupted for a time. This situation existed on Route 40, at the "S" bridge, and on several secondary roads.

Interruption of electric power service caused three mines of the Pittsburgh Coal Company—Montour No. 4 at Hills Station, the Midland Mine and the Westland Mine—to stop operations for several hours, throwing about 1,500 miners out of work.

The Richhill strip mine of Mc-Clane Mining Company near Meadowlands was completely flooded as high waters swept the Chartiers Creek valley, and officials said it probably could not be put back into operation for a week.

Washington, while apparently escaping the worst of the storm, had extensive damage. The City street department reported at least 200 cellars were flooded, particularly in the Tylerdale district, East Katherine avenue, and the East Maiden street area.

City Firemen at 8 a. m. yesterday were called to carry a Negro woman from her Race street home, which was surrounded by from thmee to four feet of water that flooded the first floor.

Washington Tin Plate Company's boiler room was flooded by four feet of water, forcing the plant to shut down. The hot mill is expected to resume work tonight and the rest of the plant tomorrow morning.

Part of the Hazel No. 1 glass plant was flooded and two tanks had to be shut down for a few hours. Tygart Valley Glass Company was reported flooded.

Muddy water poured through the bath house at the Washington City swimming pool and deposited much mud in the pool itself, so that it had to be closed for cleaning. Many streets of the City, some of which were temporarily closed by high water, were so buried in mud that the City used its scraper to help clear them.

Belated reports from the Dunns Station area told of considerable damage and conditions which some residents claimed were the "worst in over 40 years."

Electric service was disrupted for almost six hours, it was reported, highways, fields, gardens and yards were washed, with holes, some as deep as one and two feet, reported in some roadbeds.

Ten Mile Creek, going on a rampage, raced as high as the guard rails of the new steel bridge at Lindley Mills, reports said.

A front porch on the home of Frank Phillips was wrecked. Damage to the Albert Cole store at Lindley Mill was estimated by the owner at approximately \$1,000. Windows on the first floor were smashed and a considerable amount of foodstuff was destroyed.

Fences and trees were down throughout the district.



MISS JANET M. CLARK Miss Janet M. Clark, librarian of the Citizens Library for 40 years, died at 5:30 a. m. yesterday in the Washington Hospital, after a brief illness. Her death came as a shock to the many old and young, who became acquainted with her during her years as librarian.

In all the 71 years that have passed since the Citizens Library was opened in 1872 no other person has been connected with it for so long a period.

On January 30, 1903, Miss Clark was elected to fill the vacancy in the position of librarian caused by the death of Miss Antoinette Cracraft. During the 40 years that followed she came in contact with practically every person who lived in Washington. This is especially true of children, and some of the younger generation of today are the grandchildren of many of the children who got their books from the library when Miss Clark first became the librarian.

Miss Clark was the fifth librarian at this institution.

The first was Miss Mary Gregg, who had been elected November 16, 1871. She served to April 16, 1888, when she was succeeded by Miss Mary Murphy. However, Miss Murphy resigned April 28, 1888, when Miss Willa M. Kirk was elected. She served until April 24, 1890, when she was succeeded by Miss Annie Charlton. The last named resigned February 9, 18991, when Miss Antoinette Cracraft, a former school teacher, was elected. At her death nearly 12 years

later Miss Clark was elected January 30, 1903.

The deceased was born in Washington, a daughter of the late Matthew Henderson and Rebecca Blaine Marshall Clark. Her entire life was spent in Washington. 

When all mines were running there were more than 1.000 school children in the township while carries present time there are about 500 pupils.

Independence Merging Schools

Victor Wick, Formerly Of Allegheny, Will Be In Charge

AVELLA, Aug. 12.—Plans have been completed by the Independence Township School Board for the consolidation of all schools of the area here for the term beginning Aug. 30.

Victor Wick, who has been serving as a principal in Shaler Township, Allegheny County, has been elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of T. A. Smith. He will serve as principal of the consolidated schools.

The teaching force, due to the closing of three schools, will be reduced from 22 to 16 in number. Members of the Board decided upon the retrenchment program due to a \$10,000 deficit incurred during the last school year. In addition, the Board must make a payment of \$6,000 on the bonded debt of the district this year. At the peak of the school enrollment, about 1,000 boys and girls were attending the various schools. The enrollment has now dropped to approximately 500.

Schools closed are the Independence village, Stewartown, between Avella and Independence and the Highland avenue school in Avella.

Opposition developed to the closing of the school at Independence but the Board decided to proceed with its program for the new year. Only 14 boys and girls were enrolled in the six grades at Independence at the conclusion of the past school year.

Consolidation of the schools, the Board believes, will permit economies, including the reduction in the teaching corps, which will make it possible for the district, to finance its budget during the next year. Even with the economies, a five-mill increase, 15 to 20 mills, was voted by the board to make this possible. The valuation of taxable property in the township is now placed at \$1,000,000 due to the decline in the value of coal land.

New Principal Is Not Elected

Fire Destroys Large Barn On **Hopewell** Farm

Fire Department And **Volunteers** Save **Two Structures**

A large barn on the farm of Paul Ciaffoni, in Hopewell Township, was destroyed by fire shortly after 9 o'clock Friday morning, but two other nearby building were saved by the work of the Washington Fire Department, aided by a bucket brigade.

The Fire Department received a call about 9:20 a. m., and hastened to the scene with the booster pump. By that time the fire in the barn was beyond control, but the department succeeded in extinguishing the flames in the eaves of a two-story building used as a wagon-shed and corncrib. A horse stable became so hot that the turpentine began running from the siding, but it was also saved.

A bucket brigade was formed by a score of men from the neghborhood who had responded to the call, and they kept the booster tank on the fire truck filled with water from a pool in the creek. When this was drained they carried water from the spring house.

The barn was large, being about 40 feet wide by 70 feet long, and of two stories. The other two buildings were about half that size. In addition to the loss of the building 50 tons of hay, 250 bushels of oats and a four-week-old calf were burned.

Roy McConnell, the tenant on the farm, had been in the barn about 10 minutes before the fire broke While at the springhouse out. washing milk cans he saw smoke suddenly start from the mow, and he immediately called the fire de-partment. It is believed to have been started by spontaneous combustion. No estimate has been made of the loss, but it was partly cov ered by insurance.

This farm, owned by Paul Ciaffoni, Muse, is located between Buffalo Village and West Middletown.


